

Phased School Reopening Health and Safety Plan Template

Each school entity must create a Health and Safety Plan which will serve as the local guidelines for all instructional and non- instructional school reopening activities. As with all emergency plans, the Health and Safety Plan developed for each school entity should be tailored to the unique needs of each school and should be created in consultation with local health agencies. Each school entity should continue to monitor its Health and Safety Plan throughout the year and update as needed. All revisions should be reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the school entity's public website.

This resource draws on a resource created by the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) that is based on official guidance from multiple sources to include: the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the White House, American Academy of Pediatrics, Learning Policy Institute, American Enterprise Institute, Rutgers Graduate School of Education, the World Health Organization, the Office of the Prime Minister of Norway as well as the departments of education/health and/or offices of the governor for Idaho, Montana, New York, Texas and Washington, DC.

Health and Safety Plan: West Allegheny School District

All decision-makers should be mindful that as long as there are cases of COVID-19 in the community, there are no strategies that can completely eliminate transmission risk within a school population. The goal is to keep transmission as low as possible to safely continue school activities. All school activities must be informed by <u>Governor Wolf's Process to Reopen Pennsylvania</u>. The administration has categorized reopening into three broad phases: red, yellow, or green. These designations signal how counties and/or regions may begin easing some restrictions on school, work, congregate settings, and social interactions:

- The Red Phase: Schools remain closed for in-person instruction and all instruction must be provided via remote learning, whether using digital or non-digital platforms. Provisions for student services such as school meal programs should continue. Large gatherings are prohibited.
- The Yellow Phase and Green Phase: Schools may provide in-person instruction after developing a written Health and Safety Plan, to be approved by the local governing body (e.g. board of directors/trustees) and posted on the school entity's publicly available website.

West Allegheny School District has provided training to its custodial staff to ensure proper cleaning and disinfection of its school facilities. A departmental checklist has been developed to monitor custodial performance for cleanliness and disinfection of frequently touched areas in accordance with CDC guidelines. Custodial staff will have access to backpack sprayers to perform full facility disinfection when recommended. Additionally, aerosol-based disinfecting room foggers will be deployed daily in designated areas and on an as needed basis. WASD facilities department has worked over the past three months with multiple vendors to acquire cleaning and disinfecting supplies for the school year. The District currently has enough supplies to meet CDC guidelines for cleaning and disinfecting schools. Standard cleaning, disinfecting and sanitizing of school facilities will be completed on a daily basis. Standard ventilation protocols have been altered to increase the amount of outside air brought into the facilities; in addition, the district will continue to replace air filters twice per year. The Direct Digital Controls of the HVAC system will be reviewed on a weekly basis and the percentage of outside air will be maximized based upon the projected weather forecasts. Teachers will be encouraged to open exterior windows when weather permits. Hand sanitizing stations will be made available in strategic places throughout the school, within each classroom, in the playground area and available for student and teacher use on a daily basis. Each teacher will be provided EPA approved disinfectant and microfiber cloths to address required disinfecting of classroom surfaces throughout the day as appropriate. Also, disinfectant wipe stations will be strategically placed throughout each school. An additional custodian will be staffed on the daylight shift at the High School and Middle School where cafeteria dining facilities are in use. They will be assigned to address cafeteria dining room disinfection/cleanliness and other immediate facility needs. If a dining surface is used it will be disinfected between food service periods. As the District specifically recognizes the importance of disinfecting restrooms, we will stagger use of specific restrooms at the high school and middle school to allow for deep cleaning during the school day. Elementary restrooms will have all high touch points sanitized three times per day. Frequently touched surfaces including but not limited to door handles, faucets and light switches will be cleaned/disinfected on a daily basis along with all student and teacher work surfaces. Surfaces will be treated with an EPA approved disinfectant; the solution will be allowed to sit wet on the surface (dwell time) per CDC and manufacturer guidelines to ensure full efficacy before cleaning with a microfiber cloth. For additional protection, the district will provide a disinfectant for wiping of desks between use that is classified as non-hazardous and requires no precautions for use. Parents that opt their child(ren) out of using the product should send disinfectant wipes to school with their child(ren) to wipe down student surfaces between use. Additional professional development training will be provided to all custodians regarding appropriate cleaning and disinfecting techniques as a refresher training prior to the start of school. A knowledge-based survey will be given to each participant at the conclusion of the training.

Social Distancing and Other Safety Protocols

Requirement(s)

- * Classroom/learning space occupancy that allows for six feet of separation among students and staff throughout the day, to the maximum extent feasible
- * Restricting the use of cafeterias and other congregate settings, and serving meals in alternate settings such as classrooms

Strategies, Policies and Procedures

The West Allegheny School District has developed a reopening plan that provides five-days of in-person learning for our students as well as online options parents to choose if they are not comfortable sending their child/ren back to school. In the event the Governor and/or Allegheny County Health Department warrant reductions in occupancy requiring us to limit the number of students in our schools/classrooms, the District may modify the five-day in person model by moving toward a hybrid-model with alternating in-person instructional days. Our reopening plan ensures to the extent possible that all academic programs and courses are available to all students. The comprehensive plan provides six feet of distance or 36 sq. ft. per person is available in all instructional spaces throughout the schools and requires face masks/coverings/shields. Social distancing was accomplished by strategically placing desks at six feet of distance, in the same direction, removing ancillary furniture and utilizing large spaces throughout the school to hold classes when necessary.

In order to limit the number of individuals who come in contact with each another during the school day, the team has utilized a cohort model in grades K-8 and has limited transitions where possible. Assemblies and large group gatherings will be modified, and the District will adhere to local and state guidelines pertaining to the recommended size of gatherings and ensure social distancing guidelines are followed. School administrators have developed traffic flow patterns throughout the schools and will utilize staggered arrival and dismissal protocols at the beginning and end of each school day. During the school day, necessary hallway transitions will be staggered, and students will be required to wear masks when transitioning. The District will also promote the use of outdoor spaces for class and recess when weather and circumstances permit under the strict guidelines that six feet of social distancing must be maintained. Also, the District will restrict all non-essential visitors during the school day. Any individual visiting the schools for authorized business will be health screened and temperature checked by a school nurse, in their vehicle, prior to entering the school. Face coverings, such as masks or face shields, must be worn by all non-students, both staff and visitors (including parents and guardians), while on school property, including during student drop-off and pickup. Use of district facilities for after school activities, events, and use by outside organizations will be determined at a later date in accordance with current and state guidelines.

The West Allegheny will follow all CDC, Pennsylvania Department of Health and Allegheny County Health Department guidelines as they pertain to gatherings. As such, students will be required to wear masks on District transportation, at arrival times, dismissal times and while transitioning during the school day. It is recommended that students wear face coverings while in class. Students are not required to wear masks when eating lunch, as provisions have been made to ensure six feet of social distancing.

Requirement(s)

Limiting the sharing of materials among students

Strategies, Policies and Procedures

Hand sanitizing stations will be in each classroom as well as throughout the school in high traffic areas. Teachers will be encouraged to sanitize high touch surfaces regularly and all CDC guidelines will be adhered to with regards to daily cleaning expectations. Lunches will be served to students and all self-serve lunch options will be eliminated. All food will be pre-packaged and/or served in a manner that meets Serv Safe requirements. Students will be required to hand wash and/or sanitize prior to eating or drinking during the school day.

As transportation poses one of our greatest challenges, the District is taking multiple steps to ensure safety and social distancing to the greatest extent possible. Listed below are the current actions in place:

- Encourage parents to drive their students when possible
- Have siblings share seats
- Require masks to be worn on District transportation by students and drivers
- Disinfect buses after the morning run and after the afternoon run
- Students will board buses and fill back to front on each run
- District provided hand sanitizer will be available on each bus
- Sit one student per seat where possible
- Add additional bus routes to limit ridership if necessary

In order to ensure maximum implementation of all policies, protocols and procedures related to social distancing, the District will train students staff and parents on implementation of social distancing and other safety protocols through informational videos, live Zoom sessions, and by providing informational materials, signs and posters.

Monitoring Student and Staff Health

Strategies, Policies and Procedures

West Allegheny School District will be implementing and educating our school community on monitoring (health screens), quarantining and returning to school guidelines provided by the CDC and Allegheny County Health Department. Although it is not possible to eliminate the risk of COVID, our approach is to take mitigation efforts very seriously in order lessen the likelihood of positive case exposure and to protect our staff and students. Monitoring of staff and students will be completed in two ways. The first is at home self-health checks that are required to be completed prior to coming to school. The self-health checks are not required to be reported but are necessary to be completed to support mitigation and exposure efforts. The self-health check will include a COVID symptom checklist as well as exposure questions. If a student or staff answers yes to any of the self-health check questions, they should remain home and contact the school nurse. Our second monitoring will occur upon arrival where all staff and students will have their temperature taken upon entry to the school using thermographic cameras. In the event that a high temperature is detected, a more thorough symptom screen will be conducted by the school nurse. Additionally, staff and students who have been reported as having an absence due to any illness, will be screened by our school nurses upon return to school, prior to attending classes.

In addition, West Allegheny will be requiring adherence to the current recommendations from Allegheny County Health Department (ACHD) and CDC pertaining to guarantine. The CDC and ACHD recommend a 14-day selfguarantine and/or two negative tests, based on exposure and/or high-risk travel. For staff or students with suspected or confirmed COVID, a minimum of 10 days of guarantine from first symptom along with three days (72 hours) of being symptom free or two negative tests is necessary for approval to return to school. Any confirmed positive case will require a doctor's recommendation submitted to the school nurse in order to return to school. In the event contact tracing, conducted by ACHD, determines a significant number of staff must be guarantined, it may be necessary to close schools due to lack of adequate supervision and revert to our remote learning plan. Further, we will be publishing multiple documents as well as informational videos and live virtual Zoom sessions to support staff and parents understanding of protocols, procedures and expectations related to reporting of exposure, quarantining, COVID confirmation, and safe return to school. All staff and students will be asked to complete a return to school form capturing relevant information pertaining to travel, exposure, quarantine, testing for COVID, etc. The District will continue to monitor throughout the year staff and students pertaining to travel, exposure, quarantine and testing related to COVID. We have designated a lead nurse along with the Superintendent to make determinations related to requiring quarantine and will work closely with Allegheny County on contact tracing as necessary. As we work closely with Allegheny County, parents and staff will be notified if guarantine is necessary based on exposure to a confirmed positive person and if school would need to be closed for thorough cleaning and disinfecting. Quarantine for exposure is currently recommended based on exposure of 15 minutes or more and within six feet of the positive individual. Also, all non-essential visitors will not be permitted to enter our schools; and those who are essential will undergo health and temperature screens, conducted by our nursing team, prior to admittance.

Strategic deployment of staff

West Allegheny intends to offer four educational delivery models during the 2020-2021 school year to accommodate families with differing needs.

The first model is traditional 5-day, in-person schooling for all students in grades K-12 in accordance with all CDC and PDE requirements. In the event the Governor and/or Allegheny County Health Department warrant reductions in occupancy requiring us to limit the number of students in our schools/classrooms, the District may modify the five-day in person model by moving toward a hybrid-model with alternating in-person instructional days.

The second model is online synchronous remote learning model for students in grades K-8. This model will allow students to remain home and receive virtual instruction from District assigned teachers.

The third model is the West Allegheny Virtual Academy (WAVA), which provides asynchronous remote learning instruction for students in grades K-12. Information on WAVA can be found here: WAVA

The fourth model is available to 9-12 students and is a Hybrid model, which allows students to participate in both in-person courses and courses offered virtually through WAVA. In the event Allegheny County is deemed to be in the red phase and/or PDE or the Governor mandates school closure for a significant period of time (greater than two weeks), the District will enact the enhanced remote learning plan 2.0, which reflects improvements from last year's model. Upon returning to school, social distancing and the wearing of masks/face coverings will follow health organization guidelines. Specifically, the District will comply with the mask order as per the PA Department of Health. As per the July 1, 2020 from the Pennsylvania Department of Health, face covering means a covering of the nose and mouth that is secured to the head with ties, straps, or loops over the ears or is wrapped around the lower face. A face covering can be made of a variety of synthetic or natural fabrics, including cotton, silk, or linen, and, for the purposes of the order, can include a plastic face shield that covers the nose and mouth. Face coverings may be factory-made, sewn by hand, or improvised from household items, including but not limited to, scarves, bandanas, t-shirts, sweatshirts, or towels. While procedural and surgical masks intended for health care providers

and first responders, such as N95 respirators, would meet these requirements, these specialized masks should be reserved for appropriate occupational and health care settings. Students are permitted to remove their face coverings when:

- 1. Eating or drinking when spaced at least six feet apart.
- 2. Seated at desks or assigned workspaces at least six feet apart, while working independently; or
- 3. Engaged in any activity at least six feet apart (e.g. face covering breaks, recess, etc.)

It is important to note that all classrooms are configured to comply with the six feet of social distance; students are <u>required</u> to wear a face mask/covering while actively engaging in instruction, defined as working/conversing with peers and/or the teacher. Students are <u>not required</u> to wear a face mask when working independently at their desks as a result of six feet of social distancing. Teachers are required to wear face shields and will wear masks anytime they are working within less than six feet of students.

Any student who cannot wear a mask or face shield due to a medical condition, including those with respiratory issues that impede breathing, a mental health condition, or disability, and students who would be unable to remove a mask without assistance are not required to wear face coverings. Individuals who are communicating or seeking to communicate with someone who is hearing impaired or who has another disability, where the ability to see the mouth is essential to communication, are not required to wear a mask; however, individuals will be provided the option to use another type of face covering such as a plastic face shield as necessary. Face shields will be provided by the District as requested.

The District will continue to require staff and students to wear face coverings on school buses, in large gatherings outside of the classroom when six feet or more of social distancing is not possible (both indoors and outdoors), while transitioning between classrooms, and while entering or exiting the school.

Administrative staff, school principals and nurses will continue to be in contact with the District's most vulnerable individuals regarding their health and safety. Determinations regarding the safety of a student's or staff member's return to school, who are vulnerable to COVID due to existing medical conditions, will have accommodations provided as appropriate.

Requirement(s) Strategies, Policies and Procedures

All grade K-12 students will have access to remote learning in the event that school is closed for a short or extended period of time. In the event a student has an extended illness and/or is unable to return to school continuity of services will be provided.

In addition to our nurses who are District employees, the District will also employ a day-to-day substitute nurse to assist with prevention and mitigation efforts. The District will work to maintain a robust substitute pool for all District positions, which will involve training and periodic reviews of all pandemic procedures and protocols.

West Allegheny is implementing proactive measures regarding academics, information technology, and alternate schooling options. In reference to academics, modifications will be made to minimize the sharing of student materials such as computers, manipulatives, and classroom tools in most courses. Courses such as physical education and library will have additional changes such as the elimination of swimming, the changing of clothes, and the circulation of books. Students in the Early Childhood program will attend on an A/B schedule to reduce the number of students in a classroom at one time. The District has increased the number of student devices to allow for a 1:1 distribution with technology and adopted Canvas as a learning management system. With regard to social and emotional wellness including trauma-informed practices, the District will establish an intentional focus on social and emotional skill building, mental and behavioral health, personal safety and self-regulatory capacity for all students in grades K-12. Resources for both home and school will also be made available through the school psychologists, school counselors and contracted therapists.

Each teacher will be provided EPA approved disinfectant and microfiber cloths to address required disinfecting of classroom surfaces throughout the day as appropriate. Also, disinfectant wipe stations will be strategically placed throughout each school. An additional custodian will be staffed on the daylight shift at the High School and Middle School where cafeteria dining facilities are in use. They will be assigned to address cafeteria dining room disinfection/cleanliness and other immediate facility needs. If a dining surface is used it will be disinfected between food service periods. As the District specifically recognizes the importance of disinfecting restrooms, we will stagger use of specific restrooms at the high school and middle school to allow for deep cleaning during the school day. Elementary restrooms will have all high touch points sanitized three times per day. Frequently touched surfaces including but not limited to door handles, faucets and light switches will be cleaned/disinfected on a daily basis along with all student and teacher work surfaces. Surfaces will be treated with an EPA approved disinfectant; the solution will be allowed to sit wet on the surface (dwell time) per CDC and manufacturer guidelines to ensure full efficacy before cleaning with a microfiber cloth. For additional protection, the district will provide a disinfectant for wiping of desks between use that is classified as non-hazardous and requires no precautions for use. Parents that opt their child(ren) out of using the product should send disinfectant wipes to school with their child(ren) to wipe down student surfaces between use. Additional professional development training will be provided to all custodians regarding appropriate cleaning and disinfecting techniques as a refresher training prior to the start of school. A knowledge-based survey will be given to each participant at the conclusion of the training.

Social Distancing and Other Safety Protocols

Summary: The West Allegheny School District has developed a reopening plan that provides five-days of in-person learning for our students as well as online options parents to choose if they are not comfortable sending their child/ren back to school. In the event the Governor and/or Allegheny County Health Department warrant reductions in occupancy requiring us to limit the number of students in our schools/classrooms, the District may modify the five-day in person model by moving toward a hybrid-model with alternating in-person instructional days. Our reopening plan ensures to the extent possible that all academic programs and courses are available to all students. The comprehensive plan provides six feet of distance or 36 sq. ft. per person is available in all instructional spaces throughout the schools and requires face masks/coverings/shields. Social distancing was accomplished by strategically placing desks at six feet of distance, in the same direction, removing ancillary furniture and utilizing large spaces throughout the school to hold classes when necessary.

In order to limit the number of individuals who come in contact with each another during the school day, the team has utilized a cohort model in grades K-8 and has limited transitions where possible. Assemblies and large group gatherings will be modified, and the District will adhere to local and state guidelines pertaining to the recommended size of gatherings and ensure social distancing guidelines are followed. School administrators have developed traffic flow patterns throughout the schools and will utilize staggered arrival and dismissal protocols at the beginning and end of each school day. During the school day, necessary hallway transitions will be staggered, and students will be required to wear masks when transitioning. The District will also promote the use of outdoor spaces for class and recess when weather and circumstances permit under the strict guidelines that six feet of social distancing must be maintained. Also, the District will restrict all non-essential visitors during the school day. Any individual visiting the schools for authorized business will be health screened and temperature checked by a school nurse, in their vehicle, prior to entering the school. Face coverings, such as masks or face shields, must be worn by all non-students, both staff and visitors (including parents and guardians), while on school property, including during student drop-off and pickup. Use of district facilities for after school activities, events, and use by outside organizations will be determined at a later date in accordance with current and state guidelines.

The West Allegheny will follow all CDC, Pennsylvania Department of Health and Allegheny County Health Department guidelines as they pertain to gatherings. As such, students will be required to wear masks on District transportation, at arrival times, dismissal times and while transitioning during the school day. It is recommended that students wear face coverings while in class. Students are not required to wear masks when eating lunch, as provisions have been made to ensure six feet of social distancing.

Hand sanitizing stations will be in each classroom as well as throughout the school in high traffic areas. Teachers will be encouraged to sanitize high touch surfaces regularly and all CDC guidelines will be adhered to with regards to daily cleaning expectations. Lunches will be served to students and all self-serve lunch options will be eliminated. All food will be pre-packaged and/or served in

a manner that meets Serv Safe requirements. Students will be required to hand wash and/or sanitize prior to eating or drinking during the school day.

As transportation poses one of our greatest challenges, the District is taking multiple steps to ensure safety and social distancing to the greatest extent possible. Listed below are the current actions in place:

- Encourage parents to drive their students when possible
- Have siblings share seats
- Require masks to be worn on District transportation by students and drivers
- Disinfect buses after the morning run and after the afternoon run
- Students will board buses and fill back to front on each run
- District provided hand sanitizer will be available on each bus
- Sit one student per seat where possible
- Add additional bus routes to limit ridership if necessary

In order to ensure maximum implementation of all policies, protocols and procedures related to social distancing, the District will train students staff and parents on implementation of social distancing and other safety protocols through informational videos, live Zoom sessions, and by providing informational materials, signs and posters.

Monitoring Student and Staff Health

Summary: West Allegheny School District will be implementing and educating our school community on monitoring (health screens), quarantining and returning to school guidelines provided by the CDC and Allegheny County Health Department. Although it is not possible to eliminate the risk of COVID, our approach is to take mitigation efforts very seriously in order lessen the likelihood of positive case exposure and to protect our staff and students. Monitoring of staff and students will be completed in two ways. The first is at home self-health checks that are required to be completed prior to coming to school. The self-health checks are not required to be reported but are necessary to be completed to support mitigation and exposure efforts. The self-health check will include a COVID symptom checklist as well as exposure questions. If a student or staff answers yes to any of the self-health check questions, they should remain home and contact the school nurse. Our second monitoring will occur upon arrival when all staff and students will have their temperature taken upon entry to the school using thermographic cameras. In the event that a temperature is detected, a more thorough symptom screen will be conducted by the school nurse. Additionally, staff and students who have been reported as having an absence due to any illness, will be screened by our school nurses upon return to school, prior to attending classes.

In addition, West Allegheny will be requiring adherence to the current recommendations from Allegheny County Health Department (ACHD) and CDC pertaining to quarantine. The CDC and ACHD recommend a 14-day self-quarantine and/or two negative tests, based on exposure and/or high-risk travel. For staff or students with suspected or confirmed COVID, a minimum of 10 days of quarantine from first symptom along with three days (72 hours) of being symptom free or two negative tests is necessary for approval to return to school. Any confirmed positive case will require a doctor's recommendation submitted to the school nurse in order to return to school. In the event contact tracing, conducted by ACHD, determines a significant number of staff must be quarantined, it may be necessary to close schools due to lack of adequate supervision and revert to our remote learning plan.

Further, we will be publishing multiple documents as well as informational videos and live virtual Zoom sessions to support staff and parents understanding of protocols, procedures and expectations related to reporting of exposure, quarantining, COVID confirmation, and safe return to school. All staff and students will be asked to complete a return to school form capturing relevant information pertaining to travel, exposure, quarantine, testing for COVID, etc. The District will continue to monitor throughout the year staff and students pertaining to travel, exposure, quarantine and testing related to COVID. We have designated a lead nurse along with the Superintendent to make determinations related to requiring quarantine and will work closely with Allegheny County on contact tracing as necessary. As we work closely with Allegheny County, parents and staff will be notified if quarantine is necessary based on exposure to a confirmed positive person and if school would need to be closed for thorough cleaning and disinfecting. Quarantine for exposure is currently recommended based on exposure of 15 minutes or more and within six feet of the positive individual. Also, all non-essential visitors will not be permitted to enter our schools and those who are essential will undergo health and temperature screens, conducted by our nursing team, prior to admittance.

Other Considerations for Students and Staff

Summary of Responses to Key Questions: West Allegheny intends to offer four educational delivery models during the 2020-2021 school year to accommodate families with differing needs.

The first model is traditional 5-day, in-person schooling for all students in grades K-12 in accordance with all CDC and PDE requirements. In the event the Governor and/or Allegheny County Health Department warrant reductions in occupancy requiring us to limit the number of students in our schools/classrooms, the District may modify the five-day in person model by moving toward a hybrid-model with alternating in-person instructional days.

The second model is online synchronous remote learning model for students in grades K-8. This model will allow students to remain home and receive virtual instruction from District assigned teachers.

The third model is the West Allegheny Virtual Academy (WAVA), which provides asynchronous remote learning instruction for students in grades K-12. Information on WAVA can be found here: <u>WAVA</u>

The fourth model is available to 9-12 students and is a Hybrid model, which allows students to participate in both in-person courses and courses offered virtually through WAVA.

In the event Allegheny County is deemed to be in the red phase and/or PDE or the Governor mandates school closure for a significant period of time (greater than two weeks), the District will enact the enhanced remote learning plan 2.0, which reflects improvements from last year's model. Additional information regarding the three models of educational delivery available to parents and the Remote Learning Plan 2.0 can be found at the following link: WA Reopening Plan Options.

Upon returning to school, social distancing and the wearing of masks/face coverings will follow health organization guidelines. Specifically, the District will comply with the mask order as per the PA Department of Health. As per the July 1, 2020 from the Pennsylvania Department of Health, face covering means a covering of the nose and mouth that is secured to the head with ties, straps, or loops over the ears or is wrapped around the lower face. A face covering can be made of a variety of synthetic or natural fabrics, including cotton, silk, or linen, and, for the purposes of the order, can include a plastic face shield that covers the nose and mouth. Face coverings may be factory-made, sewn by hand, or improvised from household items, including but not limited to, scarves, bandanas, t-shirts, sweatshirts, or towels. While procedural and surgical masks intended for health care providers and first

responders, such as N95 respirators, would meet these requirements, these specialized masks should be reserved for appropriate occupational and health care settings. Students are permitted to remove their face coverings when:

- 1. Eating or drinking when spaced at least six feet apart.
- 2. Seated at desks or assigned workspaces at least six feet apart, while working independently; or
- 3. Engaged in any activity at least six feet apart (e.g. face covering breaks, recess, etc.)

It is important to note that all classrooms are configured to comply with the six feet of social distance; students are <u>required</u> to wear a face mask/covering while actively engaging in instruction, defined as working/conversing with peers and/or the teacher. Students are <u>not required</u> to wear a face mask when working independently at their desks as a result of six feet of social distancing. Teachers are required to wear face shields and will wear masks anytime they are working within less than six feet of students.

Any student who cannot wear a mask or face shield due to a medical condition, including those with respiratory issues that impede breathing, a mental health condition, or disability, and students who would be unable to remove a mask without assistance are not required to wear face coverings. Individuals who are communicating or seeking to communicate with someone who is hearing impaired or who has another disability, where the ability to see the mouth is essential to communication, are not required to wear a mask; however, individuals will be provided the option to use another type of face covering such as a plastic face shield as necessary. Face shields will be provided by the District as requested.

The District will continue to require staff and students to wear face coverings on school buses, in large gatherings outside of the classroom when six feet or more of social distancing is not possible (both indoors and outdoors), while transitioning between classrooms, and while entering or exiting the school.

Administrative staff, school principals and nurses will continue to be in contact with the District's most vulnerable individuals regarding their health and safety. Determinations regarding the safety of a student's or staff member's return to school, who are vulnerable to COVID due to existing medical conditions, will have accommodations provided as appropriate.

All grade K-12 students will have access to remote learning in the event that school is closed for a short or extended period of time. In the event a student has an extended illness and/or is unable return to school continuity of services will be provided.

In addition to our nurses who are District employees, the District will also employ a day-to-day substitute nurse to assist with prevention and mitigation efforts. The District will work to maintain a robust substitute pool for all District positions, which will involve training and periodic reviews of all pandemic procedures and protocols.

West Allegheny is implementing proactive measures regarding academics, information technology, and alternate schooling options. In reference to academics, modifications will be made to minimize the sharing of student materials such as computers,

manipulatives, and classroom tools in most courses. Courses such as physical education and library will have additional changes such as the elimination of swimming, the changing of clothes, and the circulation of books. Students in the Early Childhood program will attend on an A/B schedule to reduce the number of students in a classroom at one time. The District has increased the number of student devices to allow for a 1:1 distribution with technology and adopted Canvas as a learning management system. With regard to social and emotional wellness including trauma-informed practices, the District will establish an intentional focus on social and emotional skill building, mental and behavioral health, personal safety and self-regulatory capacity for all students in grades K-12. Resources for both home and school will also be made available through the school psychologists, school counselors and contracted therapists.
